*Bakken Oil Development and Interpersonal Violence:
How Gender Inequalities Impact Women’s Risk of Violence and Perceptions of Safety*

Dr. Liz Legerski is an Associate Professor of Sociology at the University of North Dakota. Her research interests include gender, social inequality, and health and social policy. She is particularly interested in the way family characteristics, employment opportunities, and social policies shape the lives of low-income and working-class families. Her most recent work involves a National Institute of Justice funded project exploring the impact of oil development on domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking in the Bakken region of ND and MT. Her research has been published in journals such as *Social Forces*, *Gender & Society*, and *Sex Roles*.
